Welfenschatz restitution proceedings: SPK Seeks United States Supreme Court Review

The Prussian Cultural Heritage Foundation (Stiftung Preußischer Kulturbesitz or SPK) filed a petition with the United States Supreme Court seeking review of a lower U.S. court decision this week.

In 2015, a lawsuit seeking the restitution of the Welfenschatz (Guelph Treasure) was filed in the U.S. against the SPK and the Federal Republic of Germany (*Philipp and Stiebel vs. Federal Republic of Germany and Stiftung Preussischer Kulturbesitz*). The SPK denies the allegations in the lawsuit. The SPK filed a motion to dismiss the case because U.S. courts do not have jurisdiction over this specific type of lawsuit. SPK's motion was denied and a court of appeals affirmed the denial in 2018.

The SPK has asked the U.S. Supreme Court to address whether an American court has jurisdiction to hear a case against a foreign government and its museum for actions allegedly occurring outside the U.S. The lower court's decision extends the jurisdiction of U.S. courts over other foreign governments and institutions – well beyond what is customary under international law. This expansion of U.S. jurisdiction may in turn expose the U.S. government to lawsuits in foreign courts for acts occurring in the U.S.

The law firm of Wiggin and Dana is representing the SPK in the U.S. proceedings.
