Sam Bardaouil and Till Fellrath named Directors of Hamburger Bahnhof, Museum for Contemporary Art, Berlin

The founders of the multidisciplinary curatorial platform Art Reoriented will take up their posts on January 1, 2022 – Grütters: Bardaouil and Fellrath will provide groundbreaking impulses for Hamburger Bahnhof – Parzinger: Curatorial duo will achieve great things for contemporary art in Berlin

At its meeting today, the Board of Trustees of the SPK (Stiftung Preußischer Kulturbesitz, Prussian Cultural Heritage Foundation) decided that Sam Bardaouil and Till Fellrath will jointly lead the Hamburger Bahnhof – Museum for Contemporary Art – Berlin of the Staatliche Museen zu Berlin (National Museums in Berlin) as Directors from January 1, 2022.

Bardaouil and Fellrath are Founders of the multidisciplinary curatorial platform Art Reoriented, which they launched in New York and Munich in 2009. They are Curators of the 16th Lyon Biennale in 2022, and have been Associate Curators at Gropius Bau in Berlin since 2017. Central to their work is inclusivity in artistic and institutional practices, and a revisionist approach to art history. They are internationally recognised curators and award-winning authors whose shared practice is rooted in global contemporary art, as well as in the field of modernist studies.


Born in Lebanon, Sam Bardaouil holds a Ph.D. in art history and a Masters of Fine Arts in Advanced Theater Practice. Till Fellrath, born in Germany, holds two Masters degrees in Economics and Political Science, and is currently Professor for Design Related Sciences at the Academy of Fine Arts in Nuremberg. This diversity in their cultural and academic backgrounds underlines their inherently collaborative model. Over the past 12 years, Bardaouil and Fellrath have jointly curated exhibitions and collaborated with more than 70 institutions worldwide, including Centre Pompidou in Paris, Mathaf: Arab Museum of Modern Art in Doha, Reina Sofia in Madrid, ARTER in Istanbul, Kunstsammlung Nordrhein-Westfalen in Düsseldorf, Tate Liverpool, Gwangju Museum of Art in South Korea, and Moderna Museet in Stockholm. At the Venice Biennale, they curated the National Pavilions of Lebanon (2013) and the United Arab Emirates (2019), and are Curators of the French Pavilion in 2022.
